Howdy everyone,



We always say that this is your chapter and these are your rides, but nobody really takes us up on that and gets involved with our rides or destinations. If you have a place you think others would like to see or a particular area that is great to ride in, please let myself or one of our road captains hear about your suggestion. I can't guarantee that we can accommodate all your requests, but we will definitely try. The whole reason we become road captains is to give the members the same experience of great rides and locations that we got to experience when we joined the chapter. One of the main reasons a H.O.G.

Chapter exists is to ride. We are definitely a riding chapter and this is one of our main functions, so we want to be sure that we are meeting and exceeding your expectations. But we can't begin to know every great spot or route, so your suggestions help us to pick new places to plan a route to and your fellow members get to enjoy your suggestion too. Feel free to call me or send me an email and we'll see what we can do.

On a safety note, when you check your tires for proper air pressure or checking your brake pads, take a extra minute or two to really check your rims. One of our members got a flat (Howard Runge) and when he went to fix it, found that he had a rather large crack in the rim. Thank God he found it out this way and not when riding. It doesn't take much to have a tire failure and you sure don't want to have one doing 50 or 60 mph on the road. So include a closer look at your tires and rims in your pre-ride checklist.

Lastly, as our season is progressing, I'm noticing several riders that lag in their spacing. Very big gaps. Obviously, riding to close to a bike is dangerous, but its almost equally as dangerous leaving too large of a gap between you and the bike in front of you. Cars and trucks can cut in to our group easily and getting the whole group through a traffic light, becomes much more difficult when the group is so much longer with that big gap in the middle. So for your safety and the safety of everyone in the group and making the road captains job much easier keeping the group together, keep your spacing to the 1 second to the bike on the left or right and 2 seconds from the bike directly in front of you. We have a GREAT safety record, so let's keep it that way. Thanks in advance

Doug Wrobel—Safety Officer



Well it's almost that time of year again, the days are getting shorter and the nights are getting longer. Before you know it, it will be time to put the bikes away. With this comes the time of year where we have to pay closer attention to the roads as well as what's alongside the roads. Those pesky four legged animals we call deer. I've already started to see more along the roads in the mornings and then the rut will start in about six weeks. So be careful.

Fall Motorcycle Riding Tips

Nathaniel Hawthorne, the 19th Century author of "The Scarlet Letter" that was known for his dark romantic literature, said: "I cannot endure to waste anything as precious as autumn sunshine by staying in the house. So, I spend almost all the daylight hours in the open air."

Though the idea of motorcycles were only in the minds of inventors at the time, Hawthorne's quote can describe a universal mindset of modern riders during the fall—especially the adventure rider who seeks long distances in the "open air."

Breathing in that crisp fall air does much for the soul, but the natural autumn conditions can provide some danger in regards to motorcycle safety.

1. Beware of Falling Leaves

This is true on the road. Falling leaves create visual hazards, especially if they are wet. They can stick to your visor easily or block a tree branch that's extending into your path of travel. Don't get distracted by leaves, regardless of how mesmerizing they are while falling.

2. Beware of Leaves on the Ground

Leaves on the ground present as equal of a hazard as falling ones. On the road, remember that though leaves look dry, the ones on the ground are likely wet, which will quickly cause traction issues and a disaster on the road.

3. Cooler Concrete, Less Traction

That says it all. Tires will come up to temperature with continuous riding, but it'll take much longer. And when stopping the tires cool down much faster, which naturally creates less traction on the road.

4. Layer Up!

Layering is the only way to go during autumn riding. Start with good <u>base layers</u> and mid layers, and always pack along an extra fleece or something similar for added warmth. This allows you to easily adjust your comfort zone while out riding.

5. Don't Forget the Rain Gear

Fall is the most unpredictable time of the year. You can be riding in pure sunshine at 70 degrees (F), and then it can drop to 50 and start raining. Even the light mist can penetrate your gear, so make sure your outer layers are up to par in the waterproof department. If you're wearing gear that's not waterproof, don't forget the rain suit!

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6. Wildlife: Extra Caution Needed

Wildlife is more active searching for food in fall, which has them scattered. Deer usually feed close to roads, and their most active feeding time is dusk and dawn. Fall is a time for hunting also, which will further scatter animals like deer and turkey. Work on maximizing peripheral vision to proactively recognize a threat and react, such as covering your brakes while slowing down, and always keep your eyes moving.

7. Beware Frosty Roads

Regardless of how warm the day temperatures can get, the mornings can provide some frosty conditions. Even the thinnest layer of frost can result in a loss of traction. Try to stay in the middle of the road since more frost will collect around the edges, and preferably ride in car-tire tracks.

8. Camping? Make Sure You Got the Essentials

Remember, it is autumn, and it can be 75 during the day and 40 at night. Plan accordingly if you're going to camp-something we highly recommend due to the beauty. Just be prepared with a warmer sleeping bag and find the most optimal place for a tent that won't take on any water or morning fog.

9. Check Tires and Fluids

Now is not the time to question your thread depth. If the tread depth is less than 2/32 of inch deep, you need some new skins. The easiest way to find out is place a penny upside down in your tread grove. If you can see Lincoln's hair, it's time for a new set. As we said, concrete is colder, and traction is less. Add some rain and you'll want to be channeling that water away from the surface of your tires.

Also, check your fluids and top off if needed. You don't want dirty brake fluid to thicken up quickly while riding in the colder weather. And for those with liquid-cooled engines, make sure your coolant is fresh

10. Check Weather Often

Weather conditions are very unpredictable in fall, and fronts moving in can drop temperatures in a hurry. Keep an even closer eye on your favorite weather app while riding, especially if you have some long distances to travel. This proactiveness is crucial to your riding comfort and safety, allowing you to plan a route around unstable skies, or find a hotel/campsite.

Concluding Thoughts

There's no denying the beauty of the autumn season. And there's also no denying the best way to experience it - and that's on a motorcycle. But some added risks arrive during the fall riding season, and preparation is key. Follow these tips to get the most enjoyment out of fall riding and keep the lifelong riding memories growing.


